Week 6, beginning 7/24/2006:

Monday:

Homework due Wednesday: Finish extra credit assignments and your Workbook.

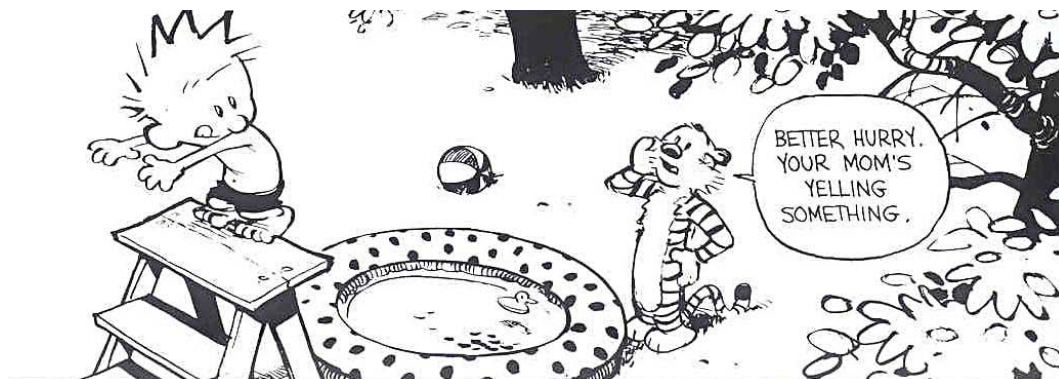
Wednesday:
